Stand-up comedian Jane Condon is known by many in town for her jokes comparing her childhood in a blue-collar Massachusetts town to her present-day surroundings in Greenwich. The *New York Daily News* called her the "J. Crew Mother of Two." Her two sons are also a source of comedic inspiration for her act and she loves to tell survival and adventure tales about them.

Frequently making the rounds at all of the big-name clubs in the New York area, including Gotham, Carolines and Stand-Up New York, she also makes time to perform locally, appearing frequently at Arcadia Coffee Company in Old Greenwich in addition to many benefit shows in town. On May 16 at Richards, Ms. Condon will perform at the fund-raiser and "friend-raiser" for the Greenwich Center for the Arts

Ms. Condon was voted "audience favorite" in New York on NBC's *Last Comic Standing* in 2007, as well as "one of the 10 stand-out stand-ups worth watching" by Back Stage. She has also made several television appearances, as a guest on ABC's *The View*, Lifetime's *Girls Night Out* and NBC's *Today* show as a profile subject. She has performed for former President William Clinton and opened for such high-profile performers as Roberta Flack.

However, jokes aren't all she has to offer. Ms. Condon is an accomplished writer and has reported for *Life* and *Fortune* magazines and worked as a creative consultant for a Linda Bloodworth-Thomason pilot. She is also the author of the book, *A Half-Step Behind*, *Japanese Women Today*.

Ms. Condon received her bachelor of arts degree in political science from Wellesley College and her master of education degree in children's television from Harvard Graduate School of Education, where she also studied acting, comedy and show development.
