Faces of Greenwich

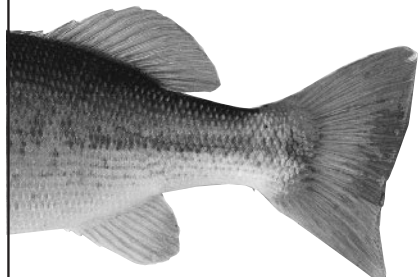
Jardar Nygaard

Fjord Fisheries fish-monger Jardar Nygaard was born in Norway and moved to Old Greenwich when

he was 6 years old. His family established the well known local fish market in Cos Cob almost two decades ago and Mr. Nygaard has been involved in all aspects of the business from the very beginning. Six years ago, he took over ownership of the store and importing business, and his dad, Oddvar, now owns and operates Fjord Catering and Charters. The younger Mr. Nygaard participates in aquaculture, the business of farming aquatic plants and animals, and leases 50 acres off Tod's Point for harvesting clams and 220 acres off the coast of Westport for raising oysters and clams. His shellfishing business is one of 10 in the state to use an upweller "nursery" system to harvest oysters from seeds. Mr. Nygaard and his wife and three children live in Riverside. In his free time he enjoys sailing and surfing and has a tremendous passion for water, having ridden waves all over the world including in Peru, Chile, Costa Rica, Fiji, Spain and Norway.
