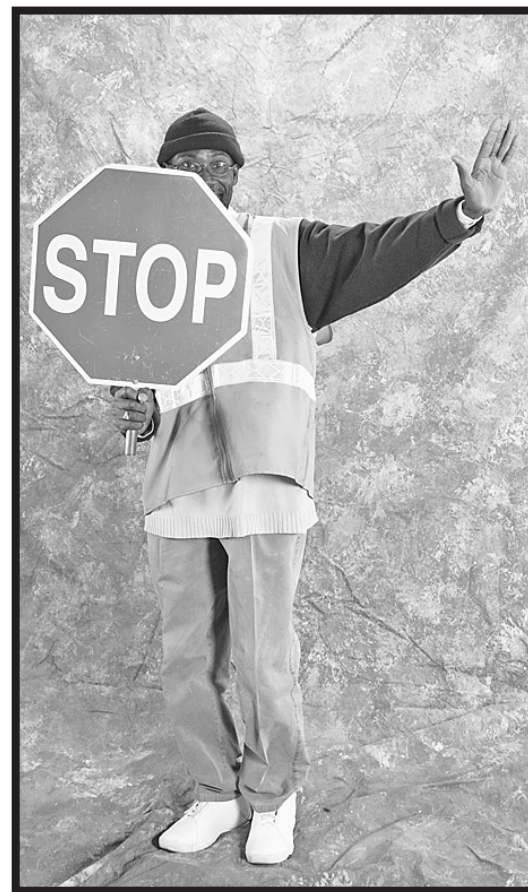
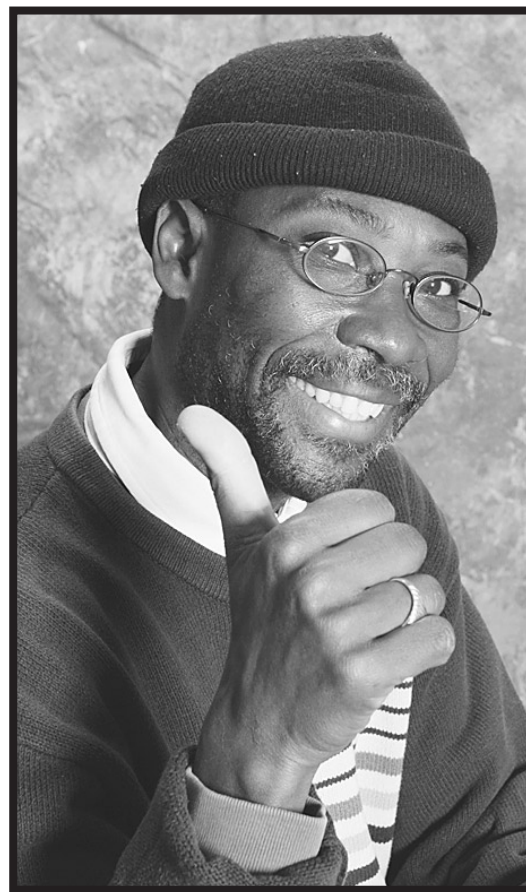
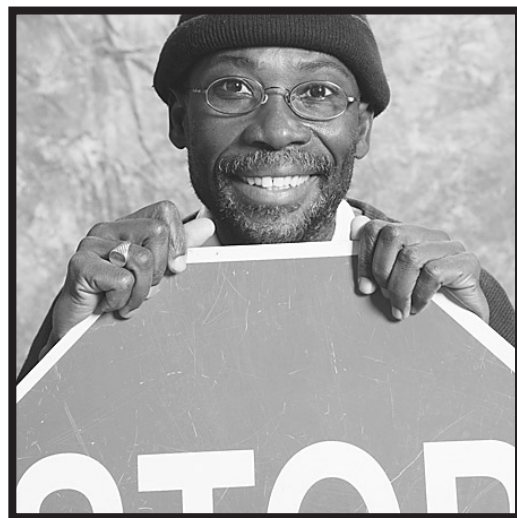

Faces of Greenwich

Patrick Lamothe

Working as a parking lot attendant at Whole Foods on West Putnam may not seem like the most fun job, but Patrick Lamothe exudes happiness at his post while directing the traffic of the chaotic shopping center in Greenwich. For more than five years, Mr. Lamothe has maintained a smile on his face each and every day at work as he greets customers and keeps the parking lot running as smoothly as possible. Many people don't understand how he keeps his composure and cheerful disposition, but he refuses to let anyone steal his joy about life.

"It is a gift from God," he states simply. "Whole Foods is a good company to work for and I get benefits for my family. Its employees and managers are all very nice, and I like interacting with the friendly customers."

Mr. Lamothe was born in Haiti and moved to the United States 27 years ago with his father and four siblings to create a better life for themselves.
